Constitutional Convention

Overview

Objective:

Students will be able to accurately describe the processes involved in drafting and ratifying the Constitution of the United States.

Essential Question(s):

How did members of the Constitutional Convention navigate the challenges as they created the framework for the United States government?

Engage

BELLRINGER: CAUSE AND EFFECT CHART

Students will be asked to recall information about the causes of the American Revolution and the weaknesses of the Articles of Confederation.

WELCOME TO THE CONVENTION: CENSUS DATA OBSERVATIONS

Each student will be given a letter welcoming them back to another day at the Convention. The letter will let the student know which state they are representing and will recap the Virginia and New Jersey Plans that have been introduced. Students will work together in groups to review census data to decide which plan is best for their state.

ROLE PLAY: DELEGATE DEBATE

After the students complete the Welcome to the Convention: Census Data Observations activity, select two students from the class, one for each plan. Have the NJ and VA supporters use the arguments they drafted on their worksheets to debate one another about the merits of their preferred plan.

CLASSROOM VOTE

Following the debate between the students above, lead the group through a classroom vote. Try to get to the point where the group achieves a 2/3 majority, even if multiple votes are required.
