Virginia Museum of History & Culture Announces Virtual Programs for October

Richmond, VA – The Virginia Museum of History & Culture (VMHC) is pleased to announce the museum's numerous online virtual digital programs for October.

Curators at Work – LIVE STREAM capABLE Friday, Oct. 9 – Noon

In Virginia, 11% of the population has a disability, and many barriers exist for this community as they seek opportunities for employment, post-secondary education, financial independence, transportation, and housing. Each year since 2017, the VMHC has partnered with the Next Move Program to present *capABLE* – an exhibition featuring the remarkable stories of young adults with diverse abilities



which demonstrates how our entire community thrives when the disability community is included. In recognition of National Disability Employment Awareness Month, Sr. Director for Curatorial Affairs, Andrew Talkov, will be joined by Next Move Program Executive Director, Elizabeth Redford, and *capABLE* model, Ryann Kress, to discuss the importance of including people with diverse abilities in the historical narrative. This program will be streamed live on the museum's Facebook and YouTube channels on Friday, October 9 at noon.

Maps gained in importance during the Age of Exploration. European explorers needed maps to follow and created their own as they explored new lands. Some maps became so important that they were copied repeatedly. These map copies, or derivatives, were especially useful to travelers and explorers to the New World.




John Smith's map of Virginia was one of these influential maps, because of the importance of the Virginia settlement and the accuracy with which Smith conducted his work. In this program, students will analyze primary sources to see how maps change over time. While this webinar is free, registration is required.
